PROGRAMME NOTES

Alexander Borodin - In the Steppes of Central Asia (1880)

The Kazakh Steppe, circa 19th Century: We are escorting a caravan across the vast grassland. The Steppes of Central Asia are silent, apart from the hoofbeats of our camels and horses and our folk songs, which weave in and out from each other, creating a complex and beautiful harmony.



Ralph Vaughan Williams – The Wasps, Aristophanic Suite (1909)

Athens, circa 420BC: Our dad has become addicted to jury duty - like so many old Athenian men they're like *Wasps*, grumpy things that swarm everywhere, stinging everything – they're so irritating! We're having an intervention – to keep dad away from the law courts we've set up a mock trial: a dispute between our dogs over cheese, with the *Kitchen Utensils* as witnesses!

Anton Bruckner – Symphony no. 7 (1885)

Austria, 1881: Anton Bruckner is asleep when his mentor picks up his viola and plays him a tune saying: "This melody will bring you success." So he immediately writes it down, and begins his *Symphony no.* 7. The next day a rooster wakes him up, inspiring the driving, repetitive theme of the *3rd movement: Scherzo*, and *Trio*.

Joe Hisaishi – Merry-go-round of Life (2004)

Another Place, What is time? Wizards, witches, age, spells, curses, fire demons, kings, the destruction of war, fate, love – in the world of Howl's Moving Castle, they're all part of *The Merry-go-round of Life*.

Gustav Holst - Jupiter from The Planets (1917)

Jupiter, Astrological Charts, 1915: Since we introduced Gustav Holst to astrology, he's become quite the master at star charts. He even wrote a suite of music about the moods of *The Planets! Jupiter* in astrology represents "abundance of life and vitality", and Gustav portrays its character with a balance of effervescence and emotion.

Igor Stravinsky – Pulcinella Suite (1922)

Naples, 1780: *Pulcinella* is quite the hunk – handsome, acrobatic, hilarious, dressed in the latest Picasso style. The ladies love him and the men are jealous! They attack him, but he plays dead and everyone runs away. But – he comes back to life. But it's not him – he appears and now there are two Pulcinellas!

But all the other men appear and they're Pulcinellas too! And they're all dancing – to music Maestro Pergolesi wrote last year but it's all been through a Stravinsky filter: rhythmic, colourful, and humorous.



Dmitri Shostakovich – Symphony 5 (1937)

St. Petersburg, 1937: The Soviet authorities have been hating on Shostakovich, and his career looks in doubt. What a come-back! The incredible *Symphony no. 5.* What a *Finale!* But can an artist tell the truth while their neighbours are being imprisoned? As long as it's in code they can – so Dmitri writes a triumphant complaint, full of quotation and implication.

William McElwee – Conductor



William has a wealth of directing and performing experience in New Zealand and the UK. He currently resides in Wellington, where he is Director of Music at St Mary of the Angels Church, Conductor of Gallery Orchestra, and Associate MD of Wellington Young Voices Children's Choir. He has performed widely as a baritone soloist including with NZ Opera, and his instrumental playing experience includes being a founding member of Straynge Discorde – The New Zealand Lute Quartet. William holds a PGDip in Performance Voice, a BSc in Mathematics and a BA

in English and Latin with Honours in English Language.
